The Gospel of Luke Reading Plan for Luke

How to use this guide:

We are so excited to walk through the book of Luke together as a church.

Some days you will have just a few verses to read, and other days a whole chapter. The most important thing is to stay engaged with scripture throughout the week! If you miss a couple days, you can read what you missed or just jump back into that day's reading.

Each day will present you with a question to help you think about the passage or apply it to your life. You can just think about this or use it as a prompt to write in a journal.

Before you read the passage each day, take a moment to pray that the Holy Spirit will help you understand what you read, and that the scripture will reveal Jesus to you. (If you've never prayed before, you can simply quiet yourself and say something to God like, "Father, I thank you for your Word. I may not understand everything I read today but I pray that through your Holy Spirit you will help me understand. Help me to know Jesus more through what I read, and help these scriptures to change the way I live. Thank you for speaking to me through the Bible. Amen."

Introduction:

Twenty or thirty years after Jesus had gone back to heaven, a Jewish disciple named Luke was inspired by the Holy Spirit to write a book. The finished product is what we know today as The Gospel of Luke. Luke was a real person. We know he was a doctor, and we know he joined the apostle Paul on some of his journeys establishing the early church.

Luke's gospel was written primarily for an educated, Greek-speaking audience. Luke intended to demonstrate to his audience that Jesus' Kingdom and power was greater than any earthly political system could ever hope to be.
